Club ride 14th April

A group of us gathered at the recently opened Waitomo fuel stop at Ruakura to leave on this ride. Jay was on his Suzuki GSX S750, Mark was on a late model GSX1000 (I think) and Aaron and Ninka were on a BMW K1600 (all 3 of them were newcomers to our rides), Michelle and I were on the Guzzi, Bob and Brett were down from Auckland for this excursion on their 2 Tridents, Mikey was already there on his 883 when we arrived, Steve P was on his Aprillia 1000 V twin, Ray arrived on his BMW R1200ST after fitting new brake discs and rushing to get a new wof the day before, and Mark arrived on his Bimota.



Because the roads were still damp after a few days of rain I elected to head out through Scotsman Valley rd, as there is not much shade through there, so the road would be good and dry. Once we got through there, we turned right at Kiwitahi to go through Walton to SH27. We turned left onto SH27 for a few kms before turning into Diagonal rd, then did a bit of a zigzag into Baker rd which took us to Manawaru where we stopped at "Café 77" for a coffee. That was where Steve joined us on his Spartan. We highly recommend this café if you are looking for something a bit different, as they have a climbing wall and a local museum, and it is on the cycle trail that goes between Te Aroha and Matamata as well. After we were fed and "coffeed", we took Shaftesbury road towards the Kaimai mountain range, and turned right into Te Aroha-Gordon rd (also called Old Te Aroha rd). We



continued right through "til we connected with SH29 (main Tauranga road) at the base of the Kaimais. We stayed on SH29 briefly before turning toward Rotorua onto SH28 and went through to the Okoroirie Pub and hot pools where we stopped for an ale and some blah, blah, blah.

There were a few bikes already there when we arrived, but not as many as I expected on such a sunny day. After a while, Aaron and Ninka headed home back to Waihi from there and the rest of us headed north toward Taotaoroa rd, crossing both SH27 and SH29, then through Whitehall and over French Pass rd into Cambridge where we stopped at Steve and Jo's for a cuppa and more discussion. Bob and Brett needed to get back to Auckland before dark, so they took off about 3pm, then each of us made our own way home from there.

We covered about 180kms of some great Waikato and Matamata/Piako roads, with enough corners and scenery for everyone. It was quite a relaxed ride with good company and a good variety of bikes.
