Hello Fellow Riders

Our shortest day has been and gone and we can look forward to better riding conditions and the countdown to Christmas. It is great to see our monthly club rides well attended with a few new riders joining in. Spread the word the more the merrier.

When it comes to road riding I am no expert but I have covered a reasonable distance by myself and in groups on a variety of bikes. Over those kilometres

these are the pearls of wisdom I have gained.



Most importantly don't get lured into riding faster than you should. This applies to many situations, you maybe riding quicker to keep up with a mate or a group of riders. You could be on your own trying to get to your destination quickly or beat your usual time or it could just be a series of your favourite corners that entices you to increase your speed.

Unlike the powers to be I am not saying speeding is the cause of all accidents, but crashes are usually a result of being caught out and when we are traveling quicker this more likely to happen.

In a group of riders let everyone know they can travel at their own pace and not be left behind. Give slower riders gentle encouragement not a windup about their speed even if your approach is light-hearted, it still applies pressure. If the slower rider is in front to set the pace give them plenty of room, following too close will push a rider along and a rider behind will often distract from what is coming up. Keep in mind it is easier to follow someone than lead plus the best way to learn is to follow.

Pressure to keep up can also apply with experienced riders traveling at the same speed. In this case the lead rider has the advantage as they can speed up or slow to pass traffic at the best spot. The follow rider is then left with less room to pass or drop back and increase speed to catch up once the opportunity to pass comes.

That's all from me just to ponder inside your helmet.

It was a great days ride with a good bunch of people. Lucky that the ride was changed to the Saturday, as the road was flooded somewhere between Whangamata and Hikuwai on the Sunday after heavy rain during Saturday night, so it was a good call.
