Well as many of you know, I went on the bucket list world tour to celebrate the gov'ment paying my instead of the other way around, having just turned 65.

I wont bore you with the other 8 weeks, but I did manage luckily, to conicide my itnerary with MotoGP at Mugello! Didn't think it would happen initially, but when the final calendar came out, it lined up perfectly, I just had to extend my stay in Florence by a few days!

Well, what an experience! What a track, what atmosphere, what noise, what everything else, it was just amazing. And to top it off, I had a prequel visit to the Ducati factory museum the day before.

Janet and I had an apartment booked in Florence, a short tram ride from the main rail station. We relied on public transport for all transport. On the Thursday we headed to Bologna for the Ducati Factory, by Flixbus, a distance of about 140 k's, total cost about \$15 each! Then took a suburban bus out to Borgo Panigale where the factory is located. Museum is, as you would expect, amazing! Trained back to Florence.



Friday practice day at Mugello. Tram to central station, train to nearest town to track, then local bus got us there. Now you think Hampton Downs has some elevation changes? Multiply that by 3 or 4 and that's Mugello. We came off the bus at the highest point, and It was a very long but mostly downhill walk to the pits. I had arranged to meet up with fellow Life Member Mike Webb, who has some job or other at the GP's. Anyway, good to catch up, and look around Race Control etc. Very hot day, high 20's, cloudless skies, stayed that way all weekend.

Long uphill walk to get back to bus to local train station, to central train station, tram back to accommodation.

Very physical day out for us oldies, lots of not flat at all walking.

Same deal Saturday, with more crowds. Final leg was to be by free shuttle bus, but I took the option of a share in a maxi taxi that took me straight there for a small fee.

The crowds are getting bigger, noisy-er, and full on. You can camp, and you take your motorcycle (or scooter) you get a ticket for that and can bring it in to certain sections of the grounds. Many people bring in highly modified, for maximum noise, and make a general nuisance of themselves. Massive group campsites, massive BBQ's, max noise.

Catering stands everywhere, and every one of them sells alcohol.

Went in search of the merchandise tents (as you do on a one-off trip). Picked out 90 Euro's of goodies for myself and Shaun, but my lucky day, when I checked the receipt back at the apartment, the guy had only keyed in 9! Score!

At the end of the day, walked for about 40 minutes before finally finding a free bus back to the local train station, and that walk was severely up and down too. Lucky I have lots of practice at the Hakarimata's.

Sunday Race day, more of the same, only more crowded, more ramped up, what a day! Yeah, you don't as much as you get on TV, but there is no substitute for soaking up the atmosphere at the track, it is so worthwhile, if you are a fan, keep it on your bucket list and do it one day.

I did have grandstand seats with a big screen in front of us. The ticker at the bottom was same as we see here in English, but the commentary was Italian so wasn't figuring out too much from what he said. Had Shaun messaging me live while he watched back at home so he kept me up with incidents I couldn't see, very handy.

Trip back total chaos, took even longer. Traffic was gridlocked around track, glad I wasn't there on 4 wheels.
